Additionally, my understanding of communication is enriched by the distinction between reason and speech. Bruce A. Kimball from, "The Liberal Arts Tradition" notes, "The central

thesis is that the history of what has empirically been called 'liberal arts' or 'liberal education' can be understood in terms of two basic traditions: one emphasizing 'reason,' including its various denotations of a rationale, a faculty of thinking, and an act of thinking; and another emphasizing 'speech,' including its meanings of the pronouncing of words, the faculty of talking, and a formal act of communication." This perspective underscores how speech and communication are central to education and professional life. While reason equips individuals with critical thinking skills, it is through speech and communication that ideas take form, relationships are built, and environments are shaped. Understanding this balance reinforces my commitment to using communication as a tool for leadership and service.

My understanding of communication shapes the way I approach my future, knowing that vocation is not necessarily a fixed path. As I have previously written, my calling may evolve over time. Perhaps one day, God will lead me in a different direction, instilling in me a new passion or guiding me toward an unexpected path. However, because of the principles I have learned through my communication studies, I can step into any new role with a ready heart. I recognize that I have the ability to shape meaning in any situation, even in times of uncertainty or challenge. By intentionally fostering positive communication, I can contribute to the creation of a meaningful and constructive environment for myself and those around me.
